

Social Justice and Disability



Social Justice Week was September 8-15.

DME sent out a resource package to encourage reflection on Social Justice through a disability lens. It included an explanation of how disability justice links in with the Body of Christ and practical suggestions for upholding the rights of disabled people in ministry units.

Fully Loved and Accepted as the Image of God

During Social Justice Week, DME held zoom hui over three evenings, 15-20 people participated over the three nights on the Rights of Disabled People. There was rich discussion about disability theology, rights of disabled people and responding to the report of the Abuse in Care and how we might be part of the healing process.

There was support for the Theological statement with some suggestions on wording and a recognition that more discussion was needed particularly with Tikanga Māori and Tikanga Polynesia before launching it.

Discussion on Human Rights and responding to the report of Abuse in Care shone a light on the ways in which the church has marginalised and excluded disabled people from full participation. Alongside this pain, there were stories of hope and Good News. There was a strong affirmation of all people being image bearers of God and healing for us all is often found in being fully loved and accepted by our communities for the people God calls us to be disabled and non-disabled.

We hope to share some more of these insights with the wider church so Watch this space!



DME keeps up with Disability changes

In August, the disability community was dealt another blow when it was announced that Whaikaha- Ministry of Disabled People would no longer be responsible for Disability Support Services funding. From October, the funding will be through Ministry of Social Development. This is not good news because the flexibility in funding that enables disabled people to have choice and control over their lives is being serevely restricted. Here's some of the great stuff already happening:

Waikato - Taupiri - Staff took part in DM training receiving their names in Braille as part of the 1 million names in Braille. Identified the need to adapt their services to include hearing impaired, with more visual cues and seating those to be able to see the speaker more clearly. They've already installed nonslip ramps both inside and out for better physical access.







We also acknowledge the passing of Kingi Tuheitia and the naming of the Māori Kuini Nga Wai Hono I te Po. Nga mihi aroha ki te Hahi Mihingare ki Taupiri, Christ's Church.



Wellington- National Camp: Increasing Accessibility

After visiting "The Abbey" National Youth Camp last year sharing ideas as to how to include more disabled youth by providing different ways of communication, Cherryl has some feedback about this year's event.

Feedback from Lorna Gray

"It was really moving- having all 3 languages (English, Te Reo and New Zealand Sign Language) was incredible

Rachel was on the main stage a Sign Language Interpreter for a speaking and worship parts. Our worship was over 50% in te reo.

A hearing member of the worship team signing the songs she knew. The communication support worker signed for 3 of the workshop sessions so out of 4 time slots for workshops - 3 had a workshop offered signing

There was wheelchair access to everything We did not use spaces that were not accessible.

We are about to release The Lord's Prayer in te reo with English translation and Rachel signing in the bottom righthand corner.

Access matters Aotearoa Kōrero for Change: Education 14 August 2024

Vicki attended this webinar where people involved in different areas of the education system came together to discuss education of disabled people. Many of the ideas could be related to the church and how welcoming and inclusive our churches are of disabled people. Mike Potter spoke about in our society there are "parking spaces" for disabled people to get them out of the way in society. This got me thinking, do we "park" disabled people in our churches in a way that is not too obvious and does not distract from the main service? Inclusion is about changing hearts and minds in believing about all people belong together and disabled people are not parked so others can get on with life without them. How do we make all things inclusive? What resources are in place so that all people can fully participate in our churches?
